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## PREFACE

Professor Philippe's account of the beginnings of the International Association for the History of Glass in the 1950s shows how much the early development of the Association owed to his vision and energy, and to the city of Liège for its generous financial support. Joseph Philippe served the Association for more than twenty-five years as the Secretary-General and latterly as the President, until he became the President-Fondateur in 1985. Since then, Pieter Ritsema van Eck and Keith King have been Secretary-Generals, and Axel von Saldern, David Whitehouse and Gioia Meconcelli Notarianni have been Presidents, while Annet van Wiechen has held the organisation together as the Secretary and the Managing Editor of the *Annales*. In these fifteen years, the Association has remained committed to its original aims, while expanding in new directions. It has continued to grow and to attract new members from many countries. In February 1999 we had 466 members from 33 countries around the world.

The 14th Congress, which held in Italy from 27th October to 1st November 1998 was a very popular event, bringing together over 300 participants from 21 countries. The meeting was a great triumph for the President of our Association, Gioia Meconcelli Notarianni, who was the original inspiration for the meeting, and for the Italian National Committee and Congress Organising Committee, Ermanno Arslan, Attilia Dorigato, Wladimiro Dorigo, Alessandra Motola Molfino, Giandomenico Romanelli and Renzo Tedeschi, and their many assistants, including Maria Grazia Diani, Elisabetta Franchini, Teresa Medici and Francesca Raguso. We owe a great debt of thanks to everyone who was involved for the enormous amount of work that went into making it a resounding success. Venice and Milan provided superb settings for our meetings in the Museo Correr and Congresso Stelline, and the visits to Murano, Padova and Adria and to the Castello Sforzesco, the

Civiche Raccolte Archeologiche and other collections in Milan were splendid, while the excellent buffet lunch in the School for Waiters in Adria lingers pleasantly in the memory. During the Congress, 84 papers and 26 posters were offered in 20 sessions, presenting a multitude of new finds and new thoughts and insights. The range and quality of the scholarship was very exciting, and provided a good illustration of the dynamism of current studies into the history of glass. Ninety-three of these papers and posters are included in this, the 14th volume of the *Annales*. The publication of this volume marks a departure from the original format of the *Annales*, as it has become necessary to change to a larger page size to accommodate the increasing number of contributions. We hope you will enjoy reading it.

As we enter the new millennium the Association is changing and facing new challenges. Very regretfully, we will shortly say goodbye to Annet van Wiechen, who is leaving to give more time to her career as a lecturer. We are very grateful to her for the support she has given to the Association in the past fifteen years, and wish her good luck in her plans for the future. The Association is currently looking for a new Secretary to replace her. Plans to set up a web-site for the Association are taking shape, which should be a great help in circulating information to members, and plans for the 15th Congress are also well in hand.

The 15th Congress will be held in October 2001 in the USA, at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York and the Corning Museum of Glass at Corning, in upstate New York. This Congress will coincide with a major exhibition of Islamic glass, Glass of the Sultans, and we look forward to seeing as many of you as possible then.
